
The backbones of our Foundation are our generous donors and the dedicated recipients of our grants. Donors may donate to benefit any of our funds, and gifts are accepted in any amount at any time. As Governing Council members, we are entrusted with being responsible stewards and distributing these funds to the many deserving organizations. Sometimes, too, we partner with other organizations to distribute grant monies. In 2021, we continued working with White County United Way to distribute Lilly Endowment COVID-19 Community Relief Funds through Jasper, Newton and White counties. These partnerships – with donors, grant recipients, and other nonprofits – are invaluable.

After attempting for the past two years (thank you, Covid!), we will be holding Community Conversations in April of 2022. Kim and Frank Spillers of Rural CommUnity Solutions will lead these discussions throughout all of White County, compiling impressions of our community from a wide variety of citizens. We are very eager to see where this takes our community foundation and county in the future. I believe the outcome of these conversations can open new opportunities, help us set our county on an intentional course, and do what's best for all of us.

Building Lives...

Building Community

In September, White County United Way acquired the property formerly known as Lakeview Commons in Monticello. The new center houses United Way, the Boys & Girls Club of White County, Bauer Resources early childhood learning center, a large central gathering area, conference room, hospitality room for supervised visitations, and workspaces for other nonprofit meetings.

In addition to its agency endowment, United Way established two new funds: the

Community Life Building Project Fund (a non-permanent fund to support initial transition and project costs) and the **Community Life Building Endowment Fund**, designed to accept gifts for permanent support of the building and the many programs it will host.

Joe Hahn: Investing in Trades Education

Joe Hahn grew up in Monon, served in the Korean War, and has spent the rest of his life in Albuquerque, New Mexico, where he built a successful business making cabinets and doors – but he's never forgotten his home community.

Now, through the **Joe R. Hahn "North White Trades Education Fund,"** students will have vastly expanded opportunities to experience hands-on learning in new fields, with potential to acquire work-ready certifications.

"Not everyone is going to college, and not everyone wants to. We need more

plumbers, electricians, and construction people... more hands-on trades people, and that includes



nurses and cosmetologists. We need to support those choices and help students get there. The earlier they can explore those opportunities, the more valuable they are to themselves, their community, and to future employers."

Joe has made initial gifts to help launch the program and established an endowment to ensure its future. Eventually, his visionary gift will total \$1M.

Leadership White County launched its ninth session in September. Twenty-one participants are learning new skills, building new networks, and learning more about our White County community as they focus their talents and interests to

do what matters.

Caring for our women and families

CFWC's Women Giving Together Fund was created to provide a vehicle for people to impact the lives of women and children in our community.

Since its inception in 2007, over \$100,000 in grants has been awarded to support social service organizations, schools and programs enhancing quality of life for our families.

Half of each donation is permanently endowed; the remaining half is set aside for grants the following year. In 2021, four different organizations received a total of \$14,172 from the WGT Fund.

After two years of pandemic cancellations, we're looking forward to welcoming friends back to our annual luncheon in June 2022. Together, we're

doing what matters.

Helping someone grow ...matters

Since it opened in 2007 "because a horse can change a life," Therapeion Therapeutic Riding Center in Brookston has worked with many area families and organizations to enrich

the lives of children and adults experiencing emotional challenges or disabilities.

Particularly as a new Executive Director was being sought to replace founder Libby Marks-Shepard, Therapeion directors chose to hire a professional facilitator to analyze its current operation and help the organization create a strategic plan for moving its mission forward.

At this important turning point in the organization's development, a grant from CFWC helped Therapeion envision and plan for the future of this unique and valuable White County asset.

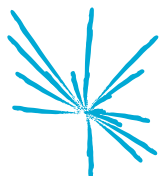

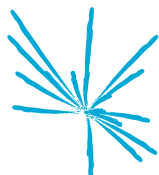

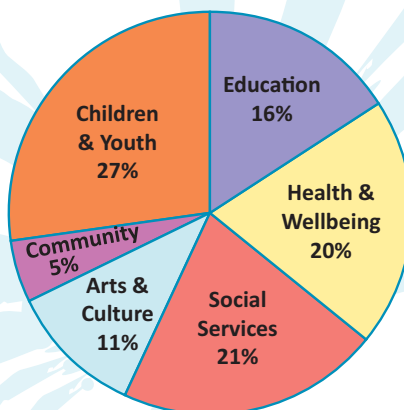

What You Do...matters

Your community foundation is a user-friendly resource for you to explore your charitable passions, bring them into focus, and create gifts that will positively impact your community...forever! And the best part? It's really easy!

You pick your interests. We help you design a plan.

You decide who will benefit. You may have specific interests or simply want to benefit the community in general. We will help you structure gifts that accomplish your desires.

You decide what to give: cash, life insurance, stock, interest in an IRA, or other assets...or combinations of assets, including estate gifts.

You decide when to give. Do you want to donate to or initiate a fund today, or defer your gift through a bequest? You can do either, or both. Also, you can decide whether you wish to remain anonymous or be publicly acknowledged, and if/when you might want that information shared.

You decide the type of gift that suits your desires:

Unrestricted funds are used to address ever-changing needs and opportunities within the community, allowing maximum resources and flexibility for CFWC grantmaking.

Designated funds assure annual support for agencies named by the fund's founding contributor.

Donor-advised funds allow founding contributors to make annual grant recommendations to the CFWC for approval. By law, recommendations are not binding, but CFWC takes them seriously and approves grants to local nonprofits that meet charitable and financial standards.

Field of Interest Funds allow donors to select areas of interest (e.g. arts, education, recreation, etc.) without designations to specific entities, allowing CFWC to address grant requests received in these broader areas.

Agency Funds help ensure annual support for our nonprofits' programming and services. Supporters may create or contribute gifts at any time and in any amount, including memorials and bequests.

Special Project Funds

support donations for non-permanent or short-term nonprofit initiatives that benefit the community. These funds are not placed into the endowment/investment portfolio.

Scholarship Funds may be created so that you participate in the selection process or leave recommendations up to CFWC.

Because the Community Foundation of White County is a public charity, donors receive the maximum deductions allowed by law. And remember – you may donate to any fund with any amount at any time.
